

Yankees Bomb Brownies 11-3 on 18 Hit Attack

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees yesterday crushed the lowly St. Louis Browns 11-3 with an 18-hit attack against three hapless hurlers.

Scoring early and often, the Yankees routed Bob Cain, in a four-run fourth inning, and continued their slugfest against Marlin Stuart and Mike Blyzka.

FOUR OF THE Yankee hits were garnered by pitcher Whitey Ford, who shut out the Browns in all but the eighth inning when the tail-enders collected four of their 11 hits to score all their runs.

It was Ford's 12th victory against four defeats.

The Yankees didn't hit a n y homers but they ripped off four triples and three doubles.

One of the doubles was made by Gus Triandos, 24-year-old rookie brought up from Birmingham to play first base. It was the only hit he made in five times at bat.

Chadwick Fails in Third Try Across Channel

DOVER, England (AP)—The treacherous English Channel—lr one of its mildest moods in weeks—finally conquered Florence Chadwick, but the 33-year-old San Diego secretary went right back in training today for another try.

"And I could start swimming again right now," she said. "But I can't understand what happened to me Sunday. I swam well and I wasn't too tired when I left the water. But the kick was missing."

Florence had swum the channel in both directions and Sunday she intended to try to make the round trip nonstop. But after paddling along for 9 hours and 55 minutes, she was pulled out. This was about nine miles from the nearest beach in France.

Big Leaguer Honored Here

Majeski 1st Member in Local Hall of Fame

Henry J. (Heinie) Majeski became the first former Eau Claire Bear voted into the local Eau Claire Baseball Hall of Fame by members of the press and radio here Sunday night.

Majeski's picture will be put on display in the lobby of Carson Park's grandstand next year and each year following another former Bear will be added to the local Hall of Fame.

THE 36-YEAR-OLD native of Staten Island, N. Y., played for the Bears in 1935 and 1936 and later went on into the majors where he became a full-fledged star with the Philadelphia Athletics.

Heinie, of Polish nationality, batted .307 in 91 games with the Bears and the following year hit .365 with 125 runs batted in, 26 homers and 42 doubles. His batting, RBI and home run marks are still Eau Claire records. He played second base for Bears.

In 1937 Majeski went to Moline and batted .345 to get another promotion. It was Class A ball at Birmingham, Ala., in 1938 and Hank hit .325 for the Barons while fielding .974 to lead the league.

The Boston Braves bought him in 1939 and he hit .272 in 106 games while playing third base for the first time in his career. The New York Yankees bought Hank in 1940 and kept him at Newark for three years where he batted .323, .303 and .345 respectively before going into service for three years.

When he returned from the Army in 1946 he hit .243 for the Yankees and was sold to the Philadelphia Athletics. He batted .280 in 1947 and went up to .310 in 1948, then dropped to .277 in 1949. The Chicago White Sox made a wise purchase when they acquired Majeski in 1950 and he batted .309 for the Pale Hose club.

BACK TO THE Athletics in 1951 he hit .282 and last year had a .269 average playing for the A's and the Cleveland Indians. He is a member of the Indians at present.

Among his major league records are an all-time fielding mark in either league of .988 for third sackers set in 1947; six doubles in a double-header in 1948 with the A's and shares another record of starting three double plays at third base with the Chis.

One of his more prominent Northern league marks is the seven hits in one eight-inning game with Eau Claire on Aug. 3, 1936.

Rosen Has Good Shot at 3 Titles

NEW YORK (AP)—Cleveland's Al Rosen has projected himself smack into the thick of the American League batting scramble and stands a good chance of winning the triple crown.

The slugging third baseman boosted his average eight points to .318 last week to pull within seven points of the leader, Mickey Vernon of Washington. Averages include Sunday's games.

NOT SINCE 1947 when Boston's Ted Williams topped the American League in batting, home runs and runs batted in has any player captured the triple crown. Rosen currently leads the league in home runs with 27 and RBI's with 91 and is fourth in hitting.

Vernon displaced slumping George Kell of the Red Sox as Kell dropped to .323.

Orestes (Minnie) Minoso of the Chicago White Sox ranks third at .322, followed by Rosen.

Al (Red) Schoendienst of the St. Louis Cardinals has regained the lead from the Giants' Monte Irvin in the National League batting race. Schoendienst's average is .341 and Irvin is hitting .335. An eye injury failed to dim Schoendienst's batting.

CARL FURILLO of the Brooklyn Dodgers stayed in third with a .330 average. Ted Kluszewski of the Redlegs and Frankie Baumholtz of the Cubs are tied for fourth at .325 each.

Milwaukee's Eddie Mathews continues to set the pace in home runs in the National League with 33 and Roy Campanella of the Dodgers maintains his runs batted in supremacy with 96.

Ed Lopat of the Yanks is back on top of the American League pitching leaders with a 10-2, won, lost percentage. Warren Spahn of the Braves is the foremost National League hurler with a 14-4 mark.
